### G1: SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICTS

- SWCDs carry out the state's conservation programs
- The are regarded highly
- Funding is a continual problem--SWCD's have no taxing authority
- Funding: local sources, general funds, capacity funding, and clean water funds
- CW funding can dilute the CW funding recommendation process
- Bills have been introduced that would allow voluntary consolidation of SWCDs and WD or to provide funding from property transfer fees

#### **G1: OPTIONS**

- Phased out CW funds/ increased general funding?
- General funds--an equal allocation to all SWCDs and an allocation based on performance?
- Levy authority?
- Fixed and permanent funding from CWF?
- Voluntary consolidation/cooperation among of SWC's and WDs?
- Changes to the tax bill?
- Local fees?
- Property transfer fees?
- Dedicated sale's tax?
- This is a complicated issue
- The issue lingers and need permanent resolution
- Proposing a dedicated hearing to listen to testimony from affected parties

# G2: RE-ACTIVATION OF WATER SUPPLY AND WASTEWATER ADVISORY COUNCIL

- The water and wastewater operators certification council was created in 1971.
- Council had rule-making authority as well as operator certification responsibilities
- Council was sun-setted in 1995
- At that time, the Water supply Systems and Wastewater Treatment Facilities Advisory
   Council with somewhat different responsibilities (no rule-making)
- The council was reviewed by the Legislature (2013) with a positive outcome for keeping the council
- However, the Council sun-setted in 2019

# G2: RE-ACTIVATION OF WATER SUPPLY AND WASTEWATER ADVISORY COUNCIL

- The activities of the committee were generally well accepted by the legislature.
- Could provide legislative input regarding water--supply systems, climate change, waste-water treatment, and operator education and certification
- Re-creation is supported by Small Cites and others
- Re-activation to ensure professional input regarding rules and guidelines
- Council would advise MDH and the MPCA
- What kind of staff support is needed?
- Solicit input from stakeholders, refine duties and prepare a bill



#### G3 RE-ACTIVATION OF THE LEGISLATIVE WATER COMMISSION

- Water issues are important, complex, controversial, and costly
- Development of water policy should be undertaken thoughtfully
- The 12 member, bi-cameral and bipartisan commission, created by the 1989 Groundwater Protection Act, brings value to the legislature by:
- Having staff provides members with a broad understanding of water issues
- Venue to discuss technical information
- Creates a public forum with Legislators that informs legislation
- Develops water expertise within the legislature

#### G3 RE-ACTIVATION OF THE LEGISLATIVE WATER COMMISSION

- The LWC was re-established in 2014, consisting from six Senators and six Reps, it is bi partisan
- Staff coordinate with the CWC, LCCMR, LSOHC and the agencies
- The LWC expired in 2019 and was replaced by the Subcommittee on Water Policy
- If the work of the Commission is important it should exist for more than 2 years?
- This would allow for a staff commitment over reasonable amount of time?
- Prepare a bill that that would re-activate the LWC for a five year period?



### G4-G5: CREATING A DEPARTMENT OF WATER RESOURCES-STREAMLINING WATER GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

- Bill introduced that would combine water responsibilities and abolish some departments (SF 2102)
- Could provide benefits as well as unintended consequences.
- One-Water Agency has been proposed and studied
- Several reviews have made suggestions for efficiency
- There should be value in evaluating some of the existing recommendation for better interagency coordination or consolidation of agency roles and responsibilities.
- There generally are two schools of thought:
   Governance is too complicated with too many agencies or the current system provides a strong and healthy competition among agencies



- Recently, the UM/ MDH (2020) studied the issue in detail
- Recommends creation of a formal coordinating entity across agencies.
- Recommends minor changes to the current statutory framework that clarifies connections among agencies and addresses recommendations that have been made in previous reports and studies
- Bill creating the coordinating entity with a report to the legislature based on existing reports?
